eight original buildings, including the 19th-century farmhouse and barn, which houses the Museum of History & Industry.

For happy-hour libations, head back to the waterfront. Cask & Schooner (1 Front St., 360/378-2922, www.caskandschooner. com) serves pints, wine cocktails, and hearty \$5 appetizers. Downriggers (10 Front St., 360/378-2700, www. downriggerssanjuan.com) is a great spot for ferry- and people-watching.

Shore-Lined Byways

San Juan's two-lane roads twist and turn amid brush-filled hills, farm fields, flower meadows, sharp cliffs, and rocky beaches. They pass lighthouses, historic sites, produce stands, and vineyards. If you're up for challenge, rent a bike from Island Bicycles (380 Argyle Ave., Friday Harbor, 360/378-4941, islandbicycles.com) and follow one of its recommended routes. A leisurely (and less-strenuous) drive is equally nice, though.

From Friday Harbor, it's 2 miles along Scenic Byway South to driftwood-strewn Jackson Beach (Pear Point Rd.) and another 4 miles to the San Juan Island National Historical Park's American Camp (4668 Cattle Point Rd., 360/378-2240, www.nps.gov/sajh), where U.S. Army troops stayed during The Pig War (1859), a five-month-long land-rights dispute between the United States and Great Britain. (It all started with the shooting of a trespassing pig, and, despite much posturing on either side, ended peacefully.) The functional Cattle Point Lighthouse (1935) is nearby.

Lime Kiln Point State Park (1567) Westside Rd., 360/378-2044, parks. state.wa.us) is home to another working (1919) lighthouse. A short path leads to a rocky viewpoint where you can spot orca or gray whales and other wildlife. Also along this southern byway are Pelindaba Lavender Farm (45 Hawthorne Ln., 360/378-4248, www.pelindabalavender. com)—with seasonal (May—Oct.) farm tours, workshops, and a cutting garden—and the San Juan County Park (50 San Juan Park Rd., 360/378-8420, www. sanjuanco.com), a popular spot for hiking and kayaking.

Alternatively, you can follow Scenic Byway North's 20-mile loop. It passes the 30-acre San Juan Vineyards (3136 Roche Harbor Rd., 360/378-9463, www. sanjuanvineyards.com), where you can taste award-winning estate whites, before entering the town of Roche Harbor, where the San Juan Islands Sculpture Park (9083 Roche Harbor Rd., 360/370-0035, www.sjisculpturepark.com) has more than 150 works along 5 marked trails.

Stop for a bite at the 1886 Roche Harbor Resort (248 Reuben Memorial Dr., 360/378-2155, www.rocheharbor.com) before heading south to Garrison Bay. The San Juan National Historic Park's British Camp (West Valley Rd., 360/378-2240, www.nps.gov/sajh) marks where the English hunkered down during The Pig War; summer sees an encampment reenactment. Just south, pick up a cozy sweater or other knit souvenir at the 80-acre Krystal Acres Alpaca Farm and Country Store (3501 West Valley Rd., 360/378-6125, www.krystalacres.com).

Eat and Stay

Backdoor Kitchen. Dinners featuring international cuisine are served in a polished-wood dining room or on a plant-filled patio. 400b A St., Friday Harbor, (360) 378-9540, www.backdoorkitchen.

Coho Restaurant. At this dinner-only restaurant, locally sourced seafood and other ingredients are given a Mediterranean twist. Look into the prix-fixe three-course Chef's Tasting menus. 120 Nichols St., Friday Harbor, (360) 378-6330, www.cohorestaurant.com.

Bird Rock Hotel. The historical exterior belies this boutique hotel's modern interior. Amenities include Wi-Fi, flat-screen TVs, and free bikes. A stay here gets you access to the pool at the Earthbox Inn & Spa, a nearby sister property. 35 1st St., Friday Harbor, (360) 378-2881, www.birdrockhotel.com.

Friday Harbor House. Watery views, cooked-to-order breakfasts, and sleek rooms with gas fireplaces and jetted tubs are among this hotel's draws.
